«Introduction to performance»

This program allows you to experience two different performing arts, Nihon Buyo (Traditional Japanese Dance) and Noh. Nihon Buyo performance entitled "Bishamon" features "Bishamonten", one of the gods associated with Kagurazaka, while Noh performance comprises the second half of "Ema", featuring the hiding of Amaterasu Omikami. After the performance there will be a lecture that explains the difference between Nihon Buyo and Noh. Some of audiences will be invited to the stage and can experience actor's movement.

- Nihon Buyo "Bishamon"

"Bishamonten" is one of the Seven Gods of Good Fortune, who is now known as a "bringer of good fortune", but traditionally was seen as a "god of war", who brought victory. The performance depicts contrasting sides "Bishamonten" as the "god of war" and the "god of good fortune", and the "light and shade" that is reflected in peoples' faith and resulting struggles.

Noh "Ema" (short play)

This performance recreates the story of a Japanese myth that the goddess Amaterasu Omikami when she appeared with Amenouzume no mikoto and Tajikarao no mikoto (both are the gods), before hiding in a rock in heaven. Amaterasu Omikami hides in the rock with the intention of punishing the bad spirits, and as a result the world falls into darkness. The other two gods perform a fascinating dance to draw Amaterasu Omikami out of the rock, in order to bring peace to the world once again.

Workshop

After the performance there will be a lecture that explains the difference between Nihon Buyo and Noh. Some of the audience will be invited to the stage and can experience actor's movement.
